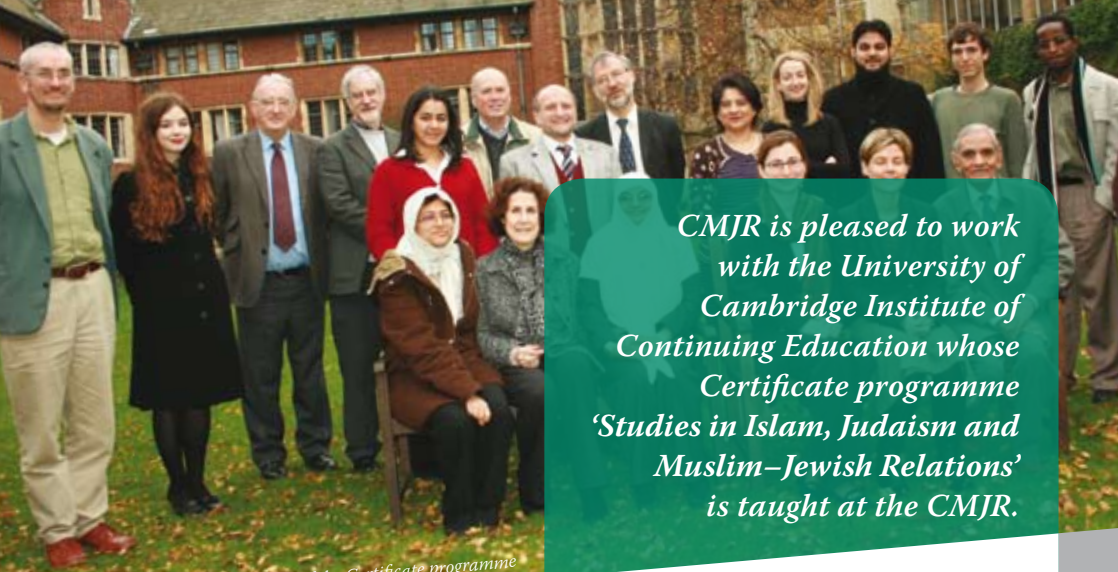


STUDIES IN ISLAM, JUDAISM & MUSLIM – JEWISH RELATIONS

CMJR is pleased to work with the University of Cambridge Institute of Continuing Education whose Certificate programme 'Studies in Islam, Judaism and Muslim–Jewish Relations' is taught at the CMJR.

The course is made up of three core modules which introduce participants to the study of the Muslim-Jewish encounter in specific contexts and which will equip students to become informed, confident and active interpreters of past and contemporary practice.

The course gives 60 credits at level 1 under the nationally recognised Credit Accumulation and Transfer Scheme. Each module will be assessed by two essays of 1500-2000 words each.

Course Overview

All classes are taught in evening seminars at Wesley House

MODULE 1: Islam and Muslim Perceptions of the 'Other'

11 meetings plus 1 fieldtrip from September 2009

Tutors: Shaykh Michael Mumisa & Dawud Bone

This module introduces students to the meaning of Islam and to Muslim perceptions of the 'Other', particularly Judaism and its followers. Other important topics will include discussions on Sharia law and the paradoxical roles that culture and religion play in Muslim life.

MODULE 2: Judaism and Jewish Perceptions of the 'Other'

11 meetings plus 1 fieldtrip from January 2010

Tutors: Dr Edward Kessler & Rabbi Dr Jonathan Magonet

This module examines a range of definitions of Judaism and Jewish identity and the effect that encounters with other traditions, particularly Islam, have had on this identity. Students will explore the significance of revealed Scripture and the practice of Jewish biblical interpretation, including a case study of 'The Binding of Isaac'.

MODULE 3: Muslim–Jewish Encounters: Challenges for Inter-Faith Dialogue

11 meetings plus 1 fieldtrip from April 2010

Tutors: Gregor Schwarb & Dawud Bone

This module will introduce students to a range of historical and current encounters between Muslims and Jews, using case studies. It will also address theoretical and methodological issues relevant to the study of Muslim – Jewish relations.
